## News from the village

The launch of Britain in Bloom 2013 was reported on the BBC Breakfast time news programme on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> April. As mentioned last month the theme this year is “Edible Britain”. We had hoped that the BBC would include an item on the village’s entry whilst filming Countryfile but unfortunately their researchers, after making contact with the team, never got back to us. You can though see what they did film around Luddenden on Sunday April 21<sup>st</sup> so look out for the programme. The “in bloom” team are once again very disappointed with the lack of media coverage by the BBC, not just for this year’s national competition, but also from past experience locally in Yorkshire in Bloom. In any case who needs the BBC when we have such supportive villagers right here on our own doorstep!

The continuing cold weather has put back spring by several weeks. We have now received our seeds from the RHS to help promote the competition and we have decided to mark our launch by making Bug Homes with the local brownies. This is because wildlife will (due to extreme cold weather) need all the help it can get this year. Brenda, our coordinator, will be undertaking this very important task on Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> and we hope to have an article featured in local newspapers.

Recent snowfall has also delayed the sowing of the wild flower meadow on the riverbank. It is hoped the Met Office predictions that the weather is starting to warm up will mean this task will shortly be completed. As mentioned previously this is a twelve-month project so there will not be much to see until spring 2014, but once established, it will be a colourful asset not just to view but also benefit wildlife. There is still the issue of the bonfire site to resolve before July but we hope the pile will be visibly reduced before the judging.

The plant and produce table on High Street will, over the coming months, have various veg, salad, fruit and plants placed on it by the team to help supplement the income raised at our two plant sales. If anyone does have excess plants, please pot them up and label them along with a price and place them on the table. We now regularly check the table to ensure anything donated is watered and, if necessary, removed so only healthy items are available. So check the table out when passing.

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## Gardening tips for May

Providing your soil is not waterlogged you can now start sowing potatoes and broad bean seeds direct into the soil. Dig out perennial weeds such as Dandelion and Herb Robert before they have time to set seed. If you have a lawn, now is the time to tidy and reshape the edges. Cut out any plain green shoots from variegated leaf shrubs to ensure they do not revert back. If you have planted any new fruit trees, bushes or shrubs along with outdoor containers, keep them watered so they do not dry out should we get a warm dry spell. Sweet peas should be pinched out to encourage bushier plants. Watch out for self-seeded plants in borders and paths such as Hellebore, Aquilegia, Foxglove and Alchemilla mollis (ladies mantle). Transplant them into small pots and grow on. Half-hardy herbs such as coriander and basil along with French and runner beans can now be started in your greenhouse or on a sunny windowsill.
