Gardening tips for June

Hopefully for the gardener, frosts are now over for the summer, but do keep an ear out for the weather forecasts just in case there is an odd plunge in temperature. Bedding can now be put out but ensure you keep dead heading, feeding and watering to prolong the flowering period. Salad crops and outdoor tomatos can be planted in the veg plot along with french and runner beans, corgettes and other members of the squash family. Earth up your potatoes to increase the crop and keep on top of the weeding by regular hoeing. Watch out for pests like green fly and slugs and take appropriate action using an environmental product. In the greenhouse stake and tie in you cordon tom's and cucumbers and keep them well ventilated on hot summer days. Don't forget you can use all sorts of containers to grow salad crops like lettuce, radish and hanging basket tom's in as long as you make drainage holes in the base. Home grown food tastes far better than shop bought produce and helps keep your bills down.

Well summer is here as swallows and swifts are flying above the village at long last. A dipper is on the river feeding its young and can often be seen on the stretch between the weir and the bridge into the cemetery. Several young robins are now visiting my feeders so it looks like they are having a successful breeding season. Plenty of bumblebees and honey bees visiting the flowers, but apart from some orange tipped butterflies I haven't seen any other species in the garden. The dawn chorus is still very musical and even the late evening bird song is magical this year although our resident Tawny Owl always has something to say. As been mentioned before in the newsletter it is still import to feed the birds but please avoid whole peanuts as they are liable to choke chicks in the nest if taken back by the parent.
