Thanks goes out once again to everyone who supported the village plant sales in May. The first plant sale where we sold perennials, salad plants and veg raised just over £600. The second sale included bedding from Kitson's, our first ever raffle, new and used gardening books and Christmas and birthday cards displaying village scenes, helped raise nearly £400. Demand was so high for bedding that we had to send out for more! All the money raised will again be ploughed back into the village and, with funding from several sponsors for areas such as Bluebell Walk, ensures the village will bloom for another year. ### Gardening tips for June

Your summer bedding should be planted out by now along with any tender plants and veg such as outdoor tomatoes, courgettes and squashes. Make sure everything is well watered during dry spells and ask someone to look after your garden when you go on holiday. Everything will need a regular feed to help keep plants thriving or to aid crop production. In the greenhouse tomatoes should be trained as a single stemmed cordon unless they are a bush variety, so pinch out the side shoots. Continue to sow salad seeds such as lettuce and beetroot for their leaves. If you have some large pots sow herb seeds such as chives, parsley and coriander and place outside in a sunny position. Divide up your primroses and primulas and sow biennials such as honesty, wallflowers and Canterbury bells for a good show next year. Start taking softwood cutting from shrubs. This is especially important if we have another winter like the one just gone and you don't want to lose your favourite plants. Check your borders for slugs and snails and support plants where necessary.
